Dealing with Substance Abuse in Your Family

Although a great amount of research has been done, no one knows why some people can use certain alcohol and drugs and not become dependent while others cannot. Although there may be different reasons why people become dependent, it is not because of a lack of willpower or morals.

Talk to your primary care physician or a behavioral health provider about the effect alcohol or drugs has on your life. He or she can help you decide what the best treatment is for you and how to access it. The road to recovery may not be easy, but it is possible with the right help.

Support groups such as Al-Anon are designed to help people who have loved ones with an alcohol or drug dependence problem. Even if your loved one is not ready to seek help, you can learn how to deal with this issue in your family.
