Whooping Cough is back!

Recent reports of large whooping cough (pertussis) outbreaks in the US have brought a lot of attention to this vaccine-preventable disease. It can affect people of all ages, but it is dangerous, and can be life-threatening to young babies. It is very contagious and spread through droplets in the air when someone sick with pertussis coughs or sneezes.

Someone who experiences the following might have pertussis:

- First symptoms are cold-like: sneezing, runny nose, no fever or a low-grade fever and a cough
- The cough persists for two weeks or more, worsening into “coughing fits” that may even make the person gag or vomit
- Children may make a high-pitched whooping sound when inhaling sharply after a coughing fit. This is less common in adults: very young infants may simply stop breathing

Antibiotic treatment can help, but the best way to prevent pertussis is with vaccine. The first dose is given at two months of age: children will have five doses before they begin kindergarten. To protect older children and adults, there is a booster vaccine. If you have not yet had a “Tdap” vaccine, you should not wait. Your health plan covers the vaccine at no cost.
