#### **Department News**



The Water Department's Wastewater Treatment Plant has made great strides in solving some of the sewer and drainage problems that plagued the city for years. For the first time during heavy rains they didn't bypass this season. This speaks volumes for their sewer line rehabilitation program. The camera truck and equipment purchased in 2007 has proven to be invaluable in locating broken lines and roots. Mike Jolly and his crew are to be congratulated on a job very well done! They are also working hard to keep the pumps pumping water into local homes and businesses.

The Water Plant personnel are quite literally swamped—not with water—but with water testing in an effort to calm the fears of Kingston citizens after the Swan Pond fly ash spill at the end of December. After sitting across from Ed Roberts every Wednesday for close to five years, you will never convince me that he would let me drink the water if he didn't think it was safe.

**Ed, Chuck, Steve** and **David** are very conscientious and continually making improvements at our water plant. In fact, according to State reports our plant was the most improved water plant in the state in 2007.

If you think you have been cold the past few days you need to join the Distribution and Collection guys. During these extreme weather conditions they have been working around the clock due to frozen water lines and broken water mains. They had four main-line breaks the weekend of January 10. Russell Miller, Alvin Pierce, Johnny Goodman, Eddie Kennedy and Kevin Hamilton spent that weekend on the streets of Kingston fixing one main break after another. I forgot to mention Robby—boy am I in trouble!

**Public Works** employees stayed busy cleaning drains to prepare for the heavy rains and patching potholes and roads damaged from waterline breaks, and doing maintenance at City Hall.

Fire Department employees spent a Saturday taking their practicals along with folks from Chattanooga and Oak Ridge—39 firefighters total. They are waiting for the results (firefighter 1 and 2). Bo Murphy has decided to go back to school to become a doctor. Building permits are slow so far this year with only 2 requests for permit applications. Eddy Lentz has been working to solve the abandoned car problem in Kingston. Last count there was only one left.

Rick Ross was elected to stay at the Joint Information Center set up as a result of the ash spill. He has reported a couple of serious building repairs needed at the Community Center. A leak in the Council room has resulted in mold and a leak in the back hallway means roof repairs.
