Memorial Day



We want to give a very special Thank You to all our military who have served and those that are continuing to serve for our country.

• Memorial Day is a day of remembering the men and women who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces.

• The first known observance of a Memorial Day type observation was in Charleston, SC on May 1st, 1865.

• Observations were conducted at various times and places until 1868 when a change was sparked by John A. Logan, Commander -in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic; organization an of northern war veterans. Mr. Logan proclaimed that "Decoration Day" should be observed on May 30th and the date was chosen because it was not the anniversary of any battle.

• The preferred name gradually changed from "Decoration Day" to "Memorial Day", however, common usage of Memorial Day did not occur until after WWII. • In 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Holidays Bill which moved the holiday from May 30th to the last Monday in May.

• Ironton, Ohio lays claim to the Nation's oldest continuously running Memorial Day parade with its first parade on May 5th, 1868. But, according to ABC News, the Memorial Day parade in Doylestown, PA predates Ironton by one year.

Flag etiquette for Memorial Day is to fly the flag at half-staff until noon and then return the flag to the top of the flag pole.:

Fishing With a Soldier—April 28


Rick,

Oliver Springs, Tenn. (WVLT) -Lindsey Fadnek used a variety of pitches to strike out 14 batters from Oliver Springs in Coalfields 4-0 victory in the District semifinal game. The total gave her 1,813 career strikeouts and first place on the state career strikeout mark, eclipsing the former mark of 1,807 career held by Megan Rhodes.

- Share feelings as well as hard facts.
- Don't jump to conclusions without checking the facts.
- Demonstrate that you are working for others' interests, as well as your own.
- Be consistent about the messages you send so people know where you stand.
- View all the alternatives before making a decision.
- Be open to new ideas but don't dismiss what's worked before.
- Be accountable for your work. If you realize you're missing the mark, avoid blaming others or making excuses.
