<u>AGREEMENT</u>

Whereas, the Roane County Emergency Communications District, hereinafter referred to as District, and the City of Kingston, hereinafter referred to as Kingston, desire to enter into an agreement.

Whereas, the District was created pursuant to pertinent Tennessee statute by the people of Roane County in a referendum on August 2, 1990.

Whereas, the District was established for the purpose of providing a system of emergency communications and whereby the telephone user could, by dialing 9-1-1, be electronically connected to Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) so that emergency services might be dispatched.

Whereas, the duly elected Board of Directors of the Roane County Emergency Communications District has determined that it is in the best interest of Roane County that one PSAP be located centrally in the County rather than providing PSAP's to each jurisdiction.

Whereas, control of the E-911 services is within the exclusive prerogative of the District.

Whereas, the District desires to contract with Kingston to provide dispatching services for Kingston.

WITNESSETH

The parties hereby covenant and agree, to-wit:

- 1. Kingston agrees to make annual payment to the District in the sum of Seventy-nine Thousand Nine hundred thirty-eight (\$79,938.00) Dollars for its share of the costs to dispatch E-911 calls. This sum shall be paid in equal monthly payments of \$6,661.50 on the first day of each month until paid in full.
- 2. The District agrees to provide twenty-four (24) hour dispatching with dispatchers trained according to national standards.
- 3. Both parties agree that the said dispatching will emanate from an Emergency Operations Center but nothing shall prevent Kingston from maintaining a separate non-emergency communications system, at its own expense.

- 4. All emergency 911 telephone calls originating from Kingston will be directed electronically to the Central Emergency Communications System.
- 5. The parties agree that the system will be governed by the rules and regulations promulgated by the Board of Directors of the District, pursuant to State law.
- 6. The parties further agree that Kingston shall have representation on said Board.
- 7. The parties agree that an advisory committee shall be appointed with one representative from the District and one representative from each user to make suggestions to the Board regarding the rules and regulations governing the operation of the Emergency Operations Center.
- 8. The parties agree that the District shall hold Kingston harmless from any injuries to person or property as a result of the negligence of the District or its employees or agents, except for any injuries to person or property caused by the negligence of Kingston.
- 9. The parties agree that no discrimination will be made, all laws will be observed, specifically including those relating to employment, so that no person, otherwise qualified, is denied an opportunity to be considered for employment on the basis of race, national origin, creed, age, sex or handicap.
- 10. This Agreement shall stay in full force and effect for a period of one (1) year, July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021. This agreement shows no increase from the previous year. This can be revisited on annual basis and agencies notified in time for their budget planning.
- 11. If any court of competent jurisdiction should declare any part of this Agreement void, illegal or otherwise ineffective, such provision shall be severed from the Agreement and the Agreement shall otherwise remain in effect according to its remaining terms and provisions, unless the severed portion is so material as to substantially alter the balance of interests expressed in the Agreement, in which event the Agreement shall fail and be of no effect, except the provisions hereof regarding liability and indemnification, supra, which shall not be effected unless specifically declared void by court order.
- 12. This contract may not be assigned. Any assignment of this contract without the written consent of the parties shall render the contract void.

A RESOLUTION REQUESTING THAT THE STATE OF TENNESSE LOCAL GOVERNMENT PLANNING ADVISORY COMMITTEE REMOVE THE DESIGNATION AND AUTHORITY OF THE KINGSTON PLANNING COMMISSION TO ADMINISTER AND PROVIDE PLANNING SERVICES AND SUBDIVISION REGULATION OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF KINGSTON

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Tennessee Code Annotated Sec. 13-4-101, a municipal planning commission was created for the City of Kingston, known as the Kingston Municipal Planning Commission; and,

WHEREAS, the said municipal planning commission was designated as a regional planning commission for certain territory located contiguous to, but outside of, the city limits of the city of Kingston to provide planning services and administer subdivision regulations in said territory; and

WHEREAS, the City of Kingston now desires that the authority of the Kingston Planning Commission to administer planning and subdivision regulations in said contiguous area be removed and transferred to the Roane County Regional Planning Commission of Roane County, Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, the Roane County Regional Planning Commission and its staff are actively involved in planning, subdivision regulations, and zoning in its designated planning region.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Kingston that the State of Tennessee Local Government Planning Advisory Committee take official action to remove any and all extraterritorial regional planning and regulatory authority devolved upon the Kingston Planning Commission, while allowing the said commission to retain all planning and subdivision authority within the city limits of the city of Kingston.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State of Tennessee Local Government Planning Advisory Committee take action to redefine the region located contiguous to, but outside of, the city limits of the City of Kingston, Tennessee and incorporate said territory into the planning region of Roane County, Tennessee. Said planning region is depicted on the attached map entitled "PLANNING REGION AND URBAN GROWTH WORKMAP, KINGSTON, TENNESSEE, Draft Revision: June 14, 2018."

RESOLUTION NO. 20-06-09-02

A RESOLUTION TO TEMPORARILY CONTINUE THE FISCAL YEAR 2020 ANNUAL OPERATING BUDGET OF THE CITY OF KINGSTON, TENNESSEE FOR FISCAL YEAR 2021.

WHEREAS, the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 as codified in *Tennessee Code Annotated* Section 6-56-210 permits the appropriations for the last fiscal year to become the appropriations for the next budget year, until the adoption of the new budget ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the financial plan and appropriations budget for the city of Kingston for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020 will not be completed and adopted by June 30, 2020

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Kingston, Tennessee, that:

Section 1. The City of Kingston hereby extends, formally adopts, and otherwise ratifies a temporary continuation budget to provide authority for appropriations until the annual budget and capital program ordinance can be adopted.

Section 2. This continuation budget shall be based on the operating appropriations of the fiscal year 2020 annual operating budget and that it will serve as the legal authority for expenditures for fiscal year 2021 until the adoption of the actual fiscal year 2021 budget.

Section 3. Expenditures made under this budget for operating expenses will not exceed those authorized by the municipal governing body for the same period in fiscal year 2020 and shall not exceed revenues received during the period the continuation budget is in force plus cash available at June 30, 2020. Capital expenditures may not be made through the authority of this continuation budget.

Section 4. Debt service obligations coming due under the continuation budget period are authorized for payment under the continuation budget and such obligations shall be met before any other expenditure, but total operating expenditures plus debt service payments shall not exceed revenues received during the period the continuation budget is in force plus cash available at June 30, 2020.
